OPPOSITE: Evoking the spirit of a European castle, this intimate courtyard features a stone turret at the entry, an antique limestone wall fountain and an arched surround sheltering a wood and glass door with an elaborately scrolled iron panel. A combination of stone and stucco walls in an earthy palette, rough-hewn wood eave brackets and whitewashed tile flooring create a patina of age. The home was designed by architect Erik Peterson and built by Montara Custom Homes.

TOP: The simple concave curve of this home's facade follows the shape of the motor court. The structure bears many features of Old World-style architecture, including pitched Saltillo-tile roofs, varying ceiling elevations, and a serpentine exterior stone wall leading to the entrance. Architect Erik Peterson designed the residence, which was built by R.J. Gurley Construction.

LEFT: A graceful groin-vaulted passageway connects the formal living and dining rooms to the main living areas of a stately European-style home designed by Gary Wyant and built by Calvis Wyant Luxury Homes. Shapely arches, polished marble flooring, lavish lighting and painted ceiling embellishments further elevate the formal Old World ambience.
